"Each Christian has to comply with the truth which the Holy Spirit has explained in the Holy Scripture - either directly or indirectly."

Jan Hus, De ecclesia (1413)

"The love of God does not find, but creates what is adorable. [...] It loves sinful, evil, foolish and weak people, to make them just, good, wise and strong, and so it pours out and shares good. This is why sinners are beautiful, as they are loved; they are not loved because they are beautiful."
